Requiring disposable food ware to be recyclable or compostable is a common sense measure to reduce overall waste that goes to landfill, especially in light of statewide mandates to provide organic composting per SB1383.

Lastly, EPS foam fragments from food ware consistently rank as one of the top 3 items found in Surfrider beach cleanups countywide. In 2019, Surfrider volunteers removed over 34,000 pieces of EPS foam from San Diego County beaches. Due to its light weight and brittle nature, foam food ware quickly breaks down into smaller pieces and is notoriously difficult - and often impossible - to clean up.

Most large fast food chains, McDonald's included, stopped using EPS foam in the late 1980's due to its poor environmental record. And over 100 California cities have successfully passed an EPS ordinance, including Encinitas, Solana Beach, Del Mar, San Diego, and Vista in San Diego County.

Please protect our ocean, beaches and planet by voting to approve Ordinance 2021-1507. It is a great first step in the right direction for a cleaner San Marcos and a cleaner coastline. Thank you for your time and service.
